The garden & Working Bee Over the last months, in fact since the AGM, your

committee and friends have been busy, firstly with the garden and surrounds. Part of the fence was removed enabling cars to be parked on the property.

We had a great and enthusiastic turnout for our



autumn working bee - 9 people in total including various pieces of equipment and tools and even a tip truck. The large old cherry



tree, beloved by many, had in fact passed its prime and large branches were hanging over the Centre roof. So it and other intrusive trees (which began life as wild seedlings) were removed. It is never an easy decision to remove grown trees but sometimes for the good of the whole this needs to be done. The timber from the cherry is in the capable hands of Chris Bacchus awaiting a new life. A wonderful bonus with the removal of the cherry tree is that the Centre building can now be viewed in all its glory and what a wonderful building it is. The tree stumps have all been ground out.

A contractor was employed to do some of the bigger work, namely the Buddleia which had overtaken the back fence - the cost of this was shared with Taikura School.

Jonathon Jordan was employed to renew the front path. This he did, and more, to create a more practical and welcome approach to the front door. The cost of the cement for this work was very kindly donated by Robin Bacchus.

We intend to have another working bee in the winter sometime to complete the garden and fence area.

Meeting with the Art in the Foyer group - Diana, Paulette and Andrea.

In the spirit of wanting to connect and work more closely with the different groups within the Centre Bernie met with the 'Art in the Foyer' group last Wednesday. One thing that was immediately present was our mutual desire to not only improve the Foyer space but also to beautify it and at the same time enhance the comfort of all who enter and use the space. The Foyer is a common space for members and friends of the Centre, it is the initial meeting place and as such needs to be a welcoming space. It was interesting that at the Conversation's morning on Monday last, there were several people new to the Centre. How do these people find out more about Anthroposophy? The question has been raised before of having the library open for one hour per week (early evening) to enable these people to meet and talk to someone and to bring their questions around what is Anthroposophy. Perhaps this question needs to be asked again?

The question of the chairs presently in the foyer was raised - these have been kindly donated over the years but are not comfortable for everyone - perhaps we could recover them, providing new and firmer cushions or we may look to the secondhand shops to see if something better is available.

This space needs painting and it is the committee's hope that this will be done before too long. The walls are very marked thus a distraction to the art hung in this space. The question of warmth especially in the winter months is already being looked at by the committee. The fact of the matter is that the Rudolf Steiner Centre is housed in a rather lovely but very cold old house and keeping all who enter warm needs to be done in a modern and financially effective manner and this is what is being looked at for the foyer.

We spoke about art in the foyer in general, what is the intention and who is this for? Is it still needed? A clear procedure for artists who wish to display works in the foyer needs to be established. It was discussed whether established local artists, (and prints from well known artists) could display works in the foyer and students arrange their displays in the art room. A wealth of questions and much contemplation to be entered into. Our conversations/discussions often moved beyond the foyer and into the needs of our young people today. Are we meeting their needs? What do they want to see, to feel, in order to become a part of this Centre.

It is so fruitful to have such conversations.
